

The Village of Palatine has created this guide to help assist those looking to open a business in our community. When identifying a potential location for your proposed business there are a number of issues that should be considered. The following outlines the initial steps you should take to ensure all of the applicable Village regulations will be followed:

Step
1

- **CHECK THE ZONING OF YOUR PROPOSED LOCATION:** The Village of Palatine contains a variety of zoning districts, with each zoning district having a specific list of permitted uses and those uses that require special use approval. It is critical to confirm if your proposed business complies with the selected location's zoning classification and what, if any, formal zoning review process may be required. Prior to making a formal commitment for a specific site, please contact the Village's Planning & Zoning Department to confirm that your proposed business is allowed at the location you are considering.

- **APPLY FOR A BUSINESS LICENSE FROM THE VILLAGE:** Most businesses require a license from the Village of Palatine. Prior to opening a business, you must apply for a business license. The appropriate Village staff will then review your business license application to confirm compliance with all applicable codes and regulations.

- **OTHER VILLAGE PERMITS & LICENSES:** Depending on your proposed type of business, the following additional licenses or permits may also be required:

- **Building Permit:** Most projects will require a building permit. Please contact the Village to determine if any planned improvements for your new business will require a permit.

- **Food Permit:** Any business that will include the storage, preparation, serving, or sale of food must obtain a food permit from the Village prior to opening. These types of businesses can include bars/restaurants, cafes, grocery stores, and concessions.

- **Liquor License:** Any business looking to sell and/or serve alcohol is required to obtain liquor licenses from the Village of Palatine and State of Illinois.
